Good Morning, Molweni, Dumelang,

On the 27th of March 2019, the municipal council entrusted and elected me as the Mayor of Umzimvubu Local Municipality, given a short period to bring about change and to continue with the implementation of municipal developmental programmes and projects. We remain cognisant of the mandate of the electorate, and under no illusion about the complexity of the task ahead.

The complexity extends to the overall makeup of this local municipality. It's worth noting that my hundred days in office materializes during the Mandela month. We embrace Madiba's values and honour his legacy through humanitarian acts and initiatives that acknowledge his never-ending quest to change the world for the better. Let me also take this moment and bid farewell to our South African Music Icon; Johnny Clegg and Veteran Actress; Nomhle Nkonyeni. Thank you for your positive contributions to our entertainment industry.

As the newly elected Mayor of Umzimvubu Local Municipality I've made it our mandate to improve the status quo of the municipality in terms of eradicating the triple challenges of unemployment, poverty and crime.

With that said, all of our communities have been included into our vision to avoid alienation as we go about our task of creating a municipality that ensures constant dialogue between its residents and relevant stakeholders. The time has now come for me to narrate a positive report since taking office on the 27th of March 2019.

Over the last financial year, we have begun to rebuild a durable social compact for fundamental social and economic transformation with key stakeholders. As social partners, we are restoring the bonds of trust, dialogue and cooperation. We are reaching out to those parts of our society that have become disaffected, disinterested or marginalised through various forms of dialogue and engagement.

During my first 100 days in office, I've robustly engaged Umzimvubu churches during the moral regeneration roadshow in aid of the gospel extravaganza. I further chaired the ratepayer's association meeting and facilitated the Exco IDP outreach programme in Betshwana. Our efforts may have been uneven, and we still have much work to do, but we have demonstrated over the last financial year our shared determination to work together to confront our common challenges.

In order to provide equal opportunities for everyone, there must be an environment where businesses want to invest, where entrepreneurship can thrive and where government is supportive and enabling. This council is committed to creating a sound business environment where there is freedom to innovate. With this said we've managed to workshop and review our municipal policies during a three day session held at the Sophia Park in KwaBhaca (formerly known as Mount Frere).

The White Paper recognises explicitly that teaching and learning, are all integral parts of a capable institution, and that knowledge production must increase if the municipal developmental goals are to be achieved. These goals are clearly articulated in municipal policies, which all identify knowledge production as an important facet for development.

We are focusing our attention, our policies and our programmes on the key parts of the economy that are labour intensive. These include agriculture and tourism.

Local Economic Development and Environmental Management

In relation to the advancement of local economic development, the municipality has issued over 66 local businesses with operating licenses during the 2018/20 financial year. Moreover the establishment of the farmer mentorship programme aided 20 farmers from Umzimvubu who were selected for both livestock and vegetable production.

The municipality remains mindful of the country's ailing economy and continues to explore for new sustainable opportunities in the agricultural sector that will benefit all local residents. The **Yellow Maize Ploughing Programme** has benefitted over 900 local residents with a number of 15 hectors per ward being planted with yellow maize. The total cost of the project is 6.8 million. The council is pleased to note that the project is complete and that communities are now currently harvesting the produce in their fields. We are fortunate to have an agricultural sector that is well-developed, resilient and diversified. We intend to use it as a solid foundation to help develop agriculture in our municipality for the benefit of all.

Through an accelerated programme of land reform, we will work to expand our agricultural output and promote economic inclusion. An **auction site** was identified near Badibanise (ward 18) in KwaBhaca. The intentions to develop an auction site by the municipality is to create a platform for local farmers to trade their livestock before it ages or loses weight during drought season. It's also pleasing to note that a service provider was appointed to design the auction site on the 15th June 2019. This is an ongoing municipal project and will be closely monitored until completion.

In relation to **vegetable production**, the municipality has identified and assisted 5 municipal wards whereby more than 200 people benefitted from the programme. The total cost of this initiative was Eight hundred thousand.

On a slightly different note, According to the National Treasury Research on SMMEs (2014) South Africa has an estimated 2.8million **small, medium and micro enterprises (SMMEs)** which contribute 52%-57% of GDP. SMMEs also provide about 60% of jobs, and contribute more than 40% of the country's total remuneration.

This means that SMME's in South Africa employ more people than private sector and government combined. Umzimvubu Local Municipality therefore has a duty to ensure that local SMME's are well supported in terms of knowledge capacity and other areas of support. The municipality has identified 4 exhibition opportunities for local SMME's to showcase their trade. These are namely: The Tourism Indaba Exhibition, The Royal Show, The Grahamstown National Arts Festival and Umzimvubu Tourism and Heritage Exhibition.

Infrastructure and Development Planning

All communities should have access to at least a minimum level of services. This is not a goal, but a constitutional obligation. The many imbalances that still exist regarding equal access to services will be addressed through the development of new infrastructure and the rehabilitation and upgrading of existing infrastructure.

In this regard the municipality aims to ensure that residents have adequate access to municipal services and infrastructure with ease. It's with this reason that the municipality has embarked on the following infrastructure related projects:

Fellow Councillors; the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) is one of government's key programmes aimed at providing poverty and income relief through temporary work for the unemployed. The EPWP is a nationwide programme covering all spheres of government and SOEs.

The programme provides an important avenue for labour absorption and income transfers to poor households, in the short to medium-term. These projects employ workers on a temporary or ongoing basis with government, contractors, or other non-governmental organisations under the Ministerial Conditions of Employment for the EPWP or learnership employment conditions.

During my 100 days in office, coincidentally 100 beneficiaries were employed for waste collection and litter picking. Another extended EPWP programme looking at town beautification and street cleaning employed 46 people which brings the total number to 146 at an invested amount of R3.4 million combined.
